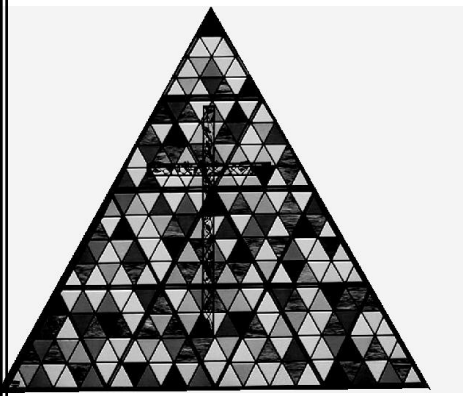

PASTOR'S PONDERING

These days when you read a text on your phone or on line, you soon realize that we are not all spelling or speaking the same way. Sometimes I wonder if we are speaking the same language. For centuries, language has been changing. Young people are always coming up with new words. We know that language is affected by time, society, and history. Webster's dictionary is constantly adding new words, such as [webisode](#), a television episode viewed from the web; [staycation](#), a vacation that occurs near one's home; and [vlog](#), a form of blog that features videos.

Language also changes meaning with time such as, "villain" once meant a peasant, or farmhand, but has come to mean a criminal individual in [modern English](#). The word, "Gay" used to mean a person who is happy, carefree or merry but now it describes a person who is sexually attracted to same sex person.

The changes to language not only affect the way we live in the world but also in the church. Even in our church, I realized recently that there were different understandings of the word "**Leader**" by people of different generations.

The word "leader" has changed its meaning such as the word "villain" or "gay". Today the predominant understanding of the word "leader" is someone who guides or directs others. And, this is how we are using the word in our Teams, such as in Worship Team, Stewardship Team, or Nurture Team. We no longer use the word "chair" of a committee but a "leader" of a Team. Yes, Leader used to mean, someone in charge, the head of a nation, political party, legislative body, or military unit. It meant somebody or something in front of all others. It still has that meaning but in everyday situations and in group settings, today most people use the word as someone who guides or direct a group they are working with and not the one who is charge. This practice is not only being used in churches but also in many business and groups.

It is confusing when the language changes and each of us have different



understandings of it. This is why many parents have hard time communicating with their children, husbands and wives, and why friends have misunderstandings. The key for all of us is to have open communication, willingness to listen not only with our ears but with our hearts. By doing so, we will learn the real issue behind the conflict. We learn from each other and can start working together to build a better relationship. We can begin to build bridges and friendships. We can grow together and be in ministry with one another.

That is what Christ has come to do, to break down walls and open the doors for all people to be part of the body of Christ. And, as the body of Christ, no matter what or how we speak, the most important thing to do is to remember who we belong to and what God is calling us to do.

During this time of Lent, we need to reflect on Jesus' sacrifice and gift. We need to make sure that we stay focused on Jesus' love and build each other up so that we can celebrate Easter as one body of Christ.

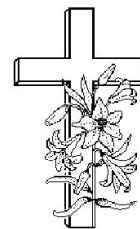

JOIN THE SUNDAY MORNING BIBLE STUDY!!

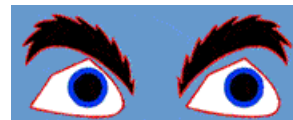

WE NEED YOUR EYES!



First needs observant members...many take responsibility for the "coffee" hour following Sunday services only to find that there are no plates on which to put cookies or crackers. Not only are supplies being used for First UMC events, it has become evident that many outside groups using the church also feel free to use the church's kitchen supplies. Needless to say when members look for supplies to use for church functions there are very few, or none at all. MUSINGS FROM THE WORSHIP LEADER

Last month, I told you about the basic pattern of worship. And for the two of you who actually read it, here is the promised next installment! This month, let's talk about music.

The first part of the service is the entrance. I told you it's a chance for people to come together and delight in the Lord. Delight in the Lord – doesn't that sound delicious? It's a chance to be happy – no, more than happy – to close your eyes, take a deep breath, and feel the love of the Lord surround you. For me, that usually happens with the music. Music is a language all of its own. I saw an episode from an old TV show this weekend that said, "That's really the whole purpose of music – to either change or enhance your mood." Music begins our service to help put us in the mood to worship – to delight in the Lord.



Another way to use music in worship is to underscore the lesson of the day. The words of a hymn can tell a story, repeat a teaching point, and remind of us something we've heard before – but can bear hearing again. At the Ash Wednesday

service, Pastor Sandra had us read the last verse of the last hymn as our benediction. Read the words below, and then tell me, can you think of better words to sing as we end our worship time and prepare to go out into the world?

**Then let us go to serve in peace,
the gospel to proclaim.
God's Spirit has empowered us;
we go in Jesus' name.**

Amen. (*The Spirit Sends Us Forth to Serve* #2241)

Sometimes the melody is what transports us to that magical place where we feel embraced by God. There are certain tunes that need no words to transport us to a special

place. One person told me they always cry when we do "I was There to Hear Your Born-ing Cry" and they don't even need the words to feel the prick in their eyes. And I personally love when Steve 'noodles' on the piano during communion and other times during worship. It almost feels like the music notes carry my prayers to God, and return His assurances back to me.

I know, I am biased – but to me, worship could not happen without music. Let me know what music during worship means to you. Is there something that always hits the spot for you? Or never does? Is there a song that means the world to you and you'd like it put in a worship service soon? Is there a form of music that you'd like to see added – or removed from – the service? Let me know. I will be happy to bring it to the worship team for our next meeting. Remember, the Worship team meets the first Sunday of every month, and we always welcome your input. After all, we are planning your worship as well as our own.

Her passion and gifts are in the areas of youth ministry, worship design, social justice and new forms of church. In her free time, she enjoys singing, hanging out with friends, volunteering in the Kid's Korner at MCI Concord and going to see her favorite band, Maeve. She graduated from Emory University in 1997 and received her seminary degree from Harvard Divinity School in 2001. Although she is an ordained elder, she is on family leave from full time appointment.

THANK YOU LETTER FROM HAITI

On behalf of the Methodist Church in Haiti and the Haitian people, we thank you. Thank you all for your outpouring of love, support and Christian brotherhood in our great hour of need. Haiti has suffered a great tragedy, and to rebuild, recover and strengthen, it will take us all.

You have kept us in your prayers and we are grateful. You have sent donations through the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR). We thank you for your generosity. You have expressed your selfless interest in volunteering your time to come to Haiti to help with the recovery effort and we look forward to welcoming you.

In the coming days and weeks, the Methodist Church in Haiti will complete an assessment of the damage and communities impacted by the earthquake, and will prioritize areas for relief and rehabilitation in partnership with UMCOR. Teams of United Methodist Volunteers in Mission will be integral in the long-term recovery of the church and communities in Haiti, and opportunities will soon be available to come and help in meaningful ways.

In the short-term, the immediate needs of providing emergency aid of food, water, shelter and medical care are being addressed by UMCOR and a host of national and international relief organizations and technical specialists. Soon, the work of clearing debris in preparation for rebuilding will be done by teams of locals in cash-for-work programs led by these same aid groups and local community groups, including the Methodist Church in Haiti. The participation of international volunteers is welcome after this initial emergency phase is complete, at which time the Methodist Church in Haiti will work closely with UMCOR and UVMIM to identify rehabilitation projects which match the needs prioritized in the country.

With great appreciation for the outpouring of support and offers to come in person to help volunteer in Haiti as quickly as possible, the Methodist Church in Haiti, in partnership with UMCOR, requests that volunteer teams consider delaying their arrival into Haiti in

light of the following:

- The Methodist Church in Haiti and UMCOR are still undertaking assessments and evaluations in the 6 circuits most impacted by the earthquake, to determine the extent of the damage in church communities and beyond. Suitable projects and assignments for volunteer teams wishing to contribute to the recovery effort will not be identified until this process is complete.
- The Methodist Guest House is currently being assessed for structural integrity, and will undergo some rehabilitation and reconstruction of the security wall before being brought to full capacity and security to host teams of volunteers.
- Commercial flights into Haiti are currently suspended and all travel into Haiti must be done via the neighboring Dominican Republic. Once in Haiti, transportation and logistics are further complicated due to the influx of international aid groups and the reality of debris and closed roads.
- The emergency relief and debris removal phase may last at least another one or two months, depending on the severity of the impact to the communities. Volunteers wishing to work on the programs identified as priority by the Methodist Church in Haiti and UMCOR can begin to schedule trips for late March and April, once this initial emergency response and recovery phase is completed.
- Volunteer teams with pre-existing travel plans to Haiti are urged to reconsider the timing and nature of their trip, in order to allow for re-assessment and prioritization of earthquake recovery programs.

Please continue to communicate with us your interest in volunteering for the recovery effort, and we will connect you with recovery projects and rehabilitation programs as soon as possible. We thank you again for standing by us in this time of great need, and look forward to working in Christian partnership to build a better Haiti.

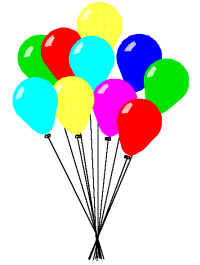

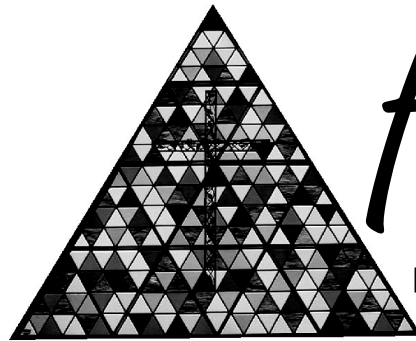
